The Care to Co-operate team at the Wales Co-operative Centre have spoken to Personal Assistants who think being part of a co-operative could be a good thing.



1. You can give your group a name and tell people in your local community that you are here to provide care and support – whether they use Direct Payments or their own money.

How will this help you? Hopefully it will lead to more hours of employment as some employers only require support for a few days or hours each week.

2. Personal Assistants, just like everyone else, take holidays, are unwell, and have families. Being part of a co-operative means that your employer doesn't go without good quality care and support whilst you're away. Other Personal Assistants in your co-operative group can step in.



How will this help you? It is comforting to know that your employer is happy whilst you are away as they are receiving the support they need.



3. Celebrate the good times with other Personal Assistants and lean on their help in the challenging times – learn from each other. You can provide training for other Personal Assistants in your group and together maintain a high level of quality support. Together you can shout about your services.

How will this help you? Your group will be known for its quality of service, skills and experience. If anyone in the local community wants to employ a Personal Assistant they will be knocking on your door!

4. You can invite your employers to meet with your group of Personal Assistants on a regular basis to chat about the service you provide. You can exchange information in a meeting that includes many people sharing ideas.



How will this help you? You will feel satisfaction knowing that the best care and support is provided when people come together. You'll benefit from a wider pool of ideas and experience.
