So, what have we been doing during lockdown?



















Technology

We have had a huge push with technology to ensure that we can progress as many projects forward in a digital and online way. Through a combination of ICF funding and some donated equipment, the programme team distributed computer equipment, easy read information guides and provided a" virtual buddy" to support citizens, families and carers to enable them to get online. This has allowed citizens to engage with a range of online projects being funded by the programme and through other third sector organisations.

Rainbow cards

Helen Dransfield from our team did a wonderful job designing the rainbow card. Families and carers supporting individuals with a learning disability and/or autism were able to show the card to police when they needed to travel outside their area and/or needed to exercise more than once a day to maintain their wellbeing. North Wales Police formally accepted the use of the



card across North Wales and over 1300 have been distributed to citizens.

This group is just growing and growing! Thank you to Bev Futia from the team who had hosted a number of Facebook live interviews over the past few months.

Funded Project Partners

As you know from our last bulletin, we have a number of project partners working with us to deliver some of the objectives of the project. A number of these projects have been able to adapt and progress their planned work in a different way. As time goes on, we will keep you posted on progress. As for now, here are a few of the projects that have been able to adapt and continue to run during lockdown.

Makaton Choir - Conwy Connect

On 30th March the Makaton Choir ran by Conwy Connect transferred to weekly online sessions. Sessions have been regularly attended by members, parents, carers and support staff. Numbers have remained constant with the addition of 6 new members, parents and carers resulting a total of 23-26 people attending weekly.



What has worked well!

- Providing a space for people to meet up thereby maintaining social contact, continuing to bond as a group and also enjoying the benefits of signing and singing together.
- Members have adapted well to the changes.
- Isolation has been lessoned and new skills have been learnt. All participants of continued to learn new signs and songs during this period.
- People are also connecting via the virtual choir Facebook page and WhatsApp group.
- New members from Conwy Connect have joined since lockdown. These are people who do not need to use Makaton as their main form of communication but are interested to communicate with other members. They also enjoy the social aspect of the group.


lTeams project via Flintshire Do-It

Flintshire DO-IT, like everyone else was massively challenged as to how they could continue

their I-Teams Project when the Pandemic struck. Having had a recent introduction to zoom video conferencing they decided to take the plunge and see if they could deliver the programme of workshops and mentoring online.

Since the 7th of April they have been delivering one-hour interactive video sessions, walking people through the process of building a 'Circle of support'. The advantage of video-conferencing is that you can invite in guests from anywhere, so they were really lucky to have Marie James, Mum to Trystan, with whom they built a successful Circle, to help them through Trystan's transition in Carmarthenshire. She brought it to life brilliantly!

They have now held 9 Zoom workshops alongside individual zoom mentoring and are pleased to report that 5 'I-Teams' have formed a Circle online, with 4 more being planned.



Great to see this project progressing virtually and we look forward to hearing all about the great work this project does going forward.

Values and Behaviours Film – TAPE & Hijinx

The aim of this project is to coproduce a video to raise awareness of important issues around values and behaviours. It aims to be a valuable resource to raise knowledge and awareness about how to best support people with learning disabilities and embed key values and behaviours within the workforce.

In the current situation, the team at TAPE have moved this project online! The sessions got underway in May using Zoom and have given participants an opportunity to come together virtually, meet new people, learn new skills whilst getting involved in creative media. This has allowed citizens to stay connected despite physical distancing.

So far the project is progressing well and we are really excited to see the finished product!

Get Checked Out North Wales

Welcome to our new website focusing on health checks. This was a piece of work that we

were able to progress during lockdown enabling a platform for health related information, including a section on Covid-19.



We launched this sooner than planned as we felt this was a resource that would be welcomed during this time.

Because of this, we only launched with the English website, however the welsh site is under development and will be live soon.
