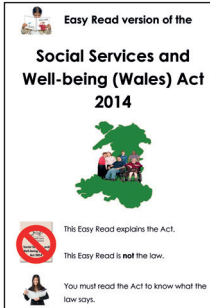

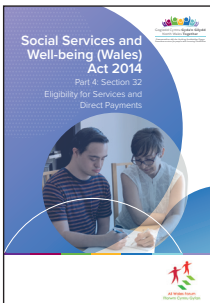
Many people in Wales need care and support from services.



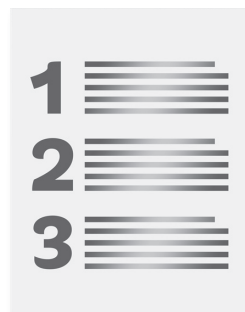
In Wales, we have a law called **The Social Services and Well-Being (Wales) Act 2014**.

Every Local Authority in Wales must decide who can get help with their care and support



This document tells you how local authorities decide if you are able to get care and support services.

Who is able to get support services?



Local Authorities use an **assessment** to decide if you are able to get help from care and support services.

An **assessment** is a list of questions to get the information needed



The **assessment** will include information about:

- What's going on in your life



- The goals you would like to reach



- What might stop you reaching your goals



- What might happen if you don't reach your goals



- Your strengths and skills.



If you are eligible your local authority will make a separate **assessment** to find out if you are able to pay for your social services.



Your Local Authority will talk to you about where you can get support to reach your goals.



For example:

- Support that is already available in your community like charities or community groups.



- Support from your family, friends or carers.



- Support from the support services in your local Authority.



Local Authority support services help people with serious needs.

For example, if you or someone you care for:



- has physical health issues



- has mental health issues



- is at risk because of age



- is disabled



- is using drugs or alcohol



Abuse is when someone hurts you or treats you badly. There are different types of abuse.

- is abused or at risk of **abuse**



- cares for someone else.



If you need help from support services, they will ask whether you want:

- the local authority to manage your care and support or



- to manage your own care and support with **Direct Payments.**

Direct Payments is money from your Local Authority to help you or your carer manage your own support.



Goals



As an adult, child or carer you may be eligible for support services and **direct payments** if:

You are not able to reach your personal goals, unless:



Council

- Your local authority provides or arranges care and support to meet your needs.



- Or your local authority helps you manage your needs by making **direct payments**.

People with serious needs



People with **serious needs** have the right to get support services.



For example, if you or someone you care for:

- is **abused** or at risk of abuse or neglect
- or is at risk of **abuse** or harm because of their age.



The law says that there should be 2 separate **assessments**.



The first **assessment** is to find out if you are eligible for social services or **direct payments**.

The second **assessment** is to find out if you are able to pay for your social services.



Your local authority will do the financial **assessment** after finding out if you are eligible or not.

The financial **assessment** is only for adults. children do not need to have it.
